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Principal's Message

The first round of report cards and interviews are now behind us and we are busily preparing for the Christmas season. As we complete the first term I wanted to take a moment to update all of our parents and guardians on a few school initiatives.

First off, we are in the process of re-doing the gathering area just outside of the library. We are thankful that our Parent Action Society was able to secure a grant through the Community Initiative Program Operating Grant. The type of grant we received had to go towards common areas within the school and could not be used for individual classrooms. Our desire, in changing the gathering area, is to create a multi-use space that can be quickly converted based on the need of the space. All of the furniture purchased is moveable and the table tops can flip up and slide together for easy storage. All of the tables have arrived and the rest of the soft seating is scheduled to arrive the first week of December. Below are pictures of the furniture and some of the various layouts that can be obtained.





Second, we are currently training our language arts teachers on how to incorporate writer's workshop into their classes.

"The workshop model is an incredibly efficient method of teaching reading and writing. Within the workshop structure, teachers are able to address both the whole group's needs as well as differentiating for the needs of small groups and individuals. When successfully implemented, the workshop model allows teachers to not only meet standards but also provide students the time and support they need to grow into fluent readers and writers." We are excited to venture into the workshop structure and to see the positive impact in student learning.

Third, we have recently purchased \$5000 of math manipulatives to aid our students in their math learning. Some of the manipulatives purchased include: two sided counters, other counters for patterning and sorting objects, dice, dominoes, calculators, playing cards and geometric shapes. We received a grant from DOW to purchase these manipulatives.

Finally, we have also had our EIPS numeracy consultant in our building working with staff and students on Number Talks. Thanks to the classroom improvement fund offered by the government, we have been able to purchase the accompanying number talks book to help our teachers in the deliverance of these short lessons. Number Talks aims to improve student's skills in number sense and operations.

To conclude this message, I want to update our school community on a staffing change. We are pleased to announce that we have hired Mr. Matt Bordato to cover for Mr. Murphy while he serves as acting assistant principal at Woodbridge Farms. Mr. Bordato officially started on

Wednesday, November 29 and will continue in this position until Mr. Murphy returns. Congratulations to Mr. Murphy on his appointment.

I hope everyone has a great December and is able to enjoy the Christmas break with family and friends.

Boundary News

As you're aware, Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) is opening a new K-6 school in Sherwood Park, named Davidson Creek Elementary, in fall 2018. In preparation for the new school, the Board of Trustees recently approved the new school's attendance boundaries and, consequently, the new elementary and junior high attendance boundaries for the northeast quadrant of Sherwood Park. A letter is being sent home that will describe exactly how the

changes will impact your children. General information is also available by visiting the EIPS webpage.

Please note that students residing in the Davidson Creek Elementary attendance area will be designated to this new school and boundary exemptions will not apply. The exception is for "grandfathered" students entering grade 6. Students in grade 6 for the 18/19 school year may continue (finish) at their current elementary school. The new attendance boundaries do not apply to students taking French Immersion, German Bilingual, Alternative Christian, Logos and system programs.

Kindergarten Registration Starts Soon!

As you may have heard, EIPS is changing its kindergarten program. Starting in the 2018-19 school year, all elementary schools will offer one kindergarten option, alternating full-day programming.

Is your child turning five on or before Dec. 31, 2018? If so, it's almost time to register for Kindergarten.

Kindergarten registration opens for the 2018-19 school year on Jan. 15, 2018. To register, simply complete the online registration form at www.eips.ca/kindergarten.

KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION CHECK LIST:

- Determine your child's designated school
- Scan and upload all required documents: proof of name, residence, date of birth and citizenship.
- Additional documents to scan, if applicable include: Guardian Letter and Parental Custody Agreement if restrictions on access.
- Once the online registration is complete and submitted, a confirmation notice will be sent to the given email address.

NOTE: The online registration form is available as of Jan.15, 2018—the paper version is no longer available.

To help families prepare, Elk Island Public Schools has put together an online toolkit to make the transition as smooth as possible. The kit includes information on registration, important dates, programming options, what to expect, eligibility, how to find your designated school, transportation and more. Connecting with Your Teens During the Holidays

• Continue family traditions

- Family traditions are important to most teens and are an opportunity to connect with one another. These events offer consistency and predictability. Despite your teen seeming bored or distant, they may appreciate and value the chance to experience the traditions together.
- Teens are in the process of developing their identity and learning new ways of thinking and relating, an outcome of this is that they often seem self-centered.
 Connect with your teen by asking their thoughts on traditions, events or ideas during the holidays and what the traditions mean to them.

Engage with your teen online

- Teens exist in two worlds, the real and the online world. The online world influences how teens relate to each other and explore and express their identity.
 Connect with your teen by asking them to show you how a specific app works.
 Teens love to teach a new skill to the adults in their life!
- Let your teen take photos of your family traditions and share them with their friends. Make your own family hashtag and take over Instagram. Teach grandma how to use filters and take silly pictures.

• Involve your teen in the holiday planning process

- Involve your teen in planning events or specific tasks that aligns with their interest; for example, they're in charge organizing and running games for their little cousins or they are responsible for making a dish for a meal.
- Teens are working at developing a sense of individuality and part of this is making decisions. Give your teen options and allow them to choose activities themselves, such as tobogganing with their younger siblings or decorating the house with their parents. Sharing decision-making power with your teen is encourage individuality and independence

Balance family and friends

- Help your teen balance time with family and friends. Discuss and come to a shared understanding of the amount of time your teen is expected to spend with family.
- Keep in mind the importance of peers during this phase of life and how much your teen is looking forward to seeing friends outside of school. Invite your teen's friends over and include them in some of your family traditions. Or start new ones! Have a holiday cookie bake-off or homemade toboggan competition.

Share the joy of giving

 Despite their often inner-focus, teens have amazing capacity for compassion and empathy. Teens can be very altruistic and passionate about different causes.
 Spend time giving back to your community as a family, support a charity and volunteer as a family, shovel a neighbour's driveway or bake cookies for the youth shelter.
