## **Counsellor's Corner**

It's hard to believe that June is here and we are looking at the end of the school year. Along with the many fun activities and celebrations comes end of the year assessments and tests. Here are some test preparation tips and ways to reduce test anxiety:

- Budget your time. Make sure you have sufficient time to study so that you are well prepared.
- Go to reviews and be an active participant. Pay attention to hints that the teacher may give about the test.
- Take careful notes and ask questions about items about which you may be confused.
- Go over any material from old tests, homework, sample problems, review material, the textbook, class notes...that might be on the test.
- Put the main ideas/information/formulas onto a sheet that can be quickly reviewed many Times. This makes it easier to retain the key concepts that will be on the test.
- Practice deep breathing and visualize yourself beforehand in the testing situation being calm and relaxed and able to recall information.
- Set your alarm and have a backup alarm set as well.
- Eat before a test, having food in your stomach will give you energy and help you focus, but avoid heavy foods which can make you groggy.
- Go to the bathroom before walking into the exam room, you don't want to waste anytime worrying about your bodily needs during the test

The following are some general ideas to use when you are writing the assessment:

- Stay relaxed and confident. Don't let yourself become anxious. Don't talk to other students before a test - anxiety can be contagious. Instead, think positively, remind yourself that you have prepared and are going to do well.
- Be comfortable but alert. Choose a good spot to take the test. Make sure you are comfortable and have enough room to work.
- Keep a positive attitude throughout the whole test and try to stay relaxed. If you start to feel nervous - use a strategy such as taking deep breaths to relax.
- Do a survey of the entire test when you first receive it so you know how to efficiently budget your time.
- Read the directions and pay attention to the directions given by the teacher.
- Answer the easy questions first. Use this as an opportunity to gain confidence and the momentum to get through the rest of the test. You are sure that these answers are correct. Do not spend too much time on one question - you can always come back to it.
- Don't rush, but pace yourself. Read the entire question and look for key words. Don't be afraid to underline or highlight parts of the questions that are key words.
- Don't worry if others finish before you - take your time and focus on your own test.

## **Student Transportation: 2015-2016 Registration is now open!**

If your child plans to use Student Transportation for the 2015-2016 school year, please make sure to register as soon as possible. Student Transportation is currently in the process of sending out invoices to all applicable families regarding 2015-2016 transportation fees. This communication includes information on how to access the ACORN system and pay your transportation fees online. The deadline for paying 2015-2016 transportation fees is June 30, 2015. Transportation fees will increase after this date. Tentative routing information will be provided to all bused families later in May.

In addition, Student Transportation is introducing a new payment plan in the 2015-2016 school year. The plan will assist families with fees of more than \$300 and allow payments over a five-month period. More information (including links to the Parent Portal and Student Quick Pay,

### **Communicating Student Learning: Update**

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) will be piloting its new elementary report cards in the 2015-2016 school year. Developed by EIPS, the report cards are designed to enrich achievement for students in Gr. 1 - 6 and enhance the quality of education within EIPS by building strong partnerships among students, teachers, and parents.

Last year, EIPS established a Communicating Student Learning committee, made up of parents, teachers, administrators, trustees, and central office staff. Using feedback from close to 1,000 parents and 400 principals and teachers, the committee has produced an innovative reporting system focused on student achievement in academic outcomes and learner attributes.

Teachers will continue to assess all areas of the current programs of studies. What will be new however, is the way in which student learning is reported. Using a five-point numeric scoring scale, teachers will indicate student achievement in clear, parent-friendly categories in each subject. The current EPAL scale will no longer be used. Additionally, the reports card will allow teachers to report personalized information about each student in relation to learner attributes, areas of strength, areas for growth, and next steps.

EIPS is excited about its new method of communicating student learning, it's innovative, inclusive, and based on what stakeholders have indicated they want to see in a reporting system. The pilot will take place in 11 EIPS elementary schools. The full implementation of the report cards will take place in 2016-2017 school year.

### **2015-2016 Grade 3 Student Learning Assessments Pilot**

As has been mandated by Alberta Education, Lakeland Ridge School will be participating in the Gr. 3 Student Learning Assessments (SLAs) pilot in the 2015-2016 school year. These assessments will be digitally based and focused on literacy, numeracy, and the cross-discipline competencies of Inspiring Education. The goal of the assessments is to provide timely information to teachers in order to ensure student learning needs are identified and to enhance classroom instruction.

Alberta Education has made a few revisions to the 2015-2016 Gr. 3 SLAs including:

- Unlike the year previous, the 2015-2016 Gr. 3 SLA pilot will be mandatory to ensure teachers, parents, and students have valid and reliable assessment information about students' strengths and weaknesses early in the school year. It will also ensure consistency for all Gr. 3 students and assurance that the education system is meeting the learning needs of students.
- The Gr. 3 SLA pilot administration period for the 2015-2016 school year will be from September 14 to October 2. This will give parents and teachers the opportunity to know students' results sooner and allow teachers the flexibility to administer the assessments over a three-week period.
- The digital component - marked by Alberta Education - and the performance tasks - marked locally - will be retained for both literacy and numeracy.
- The digital-numeracy component will focus more on basic math facts; performance tasks will be more streamlined; and accompanying materials, such as scoring rubrics, will be simplified.
- Student results for performance tasks will be reported only at the local school authority level, and not to Alberta Education as was required in the first year of the pilot.

### **The 2015 Alberta Centennial Educational Savings (ACES): A \$500 grant!**

As many of you may already know, the Province of Alberta recently announced it will be cancelling its Alberta Centennial Education Savings (ACES) grant - as of July 31, 2015. Annually, the grant provides all Alberta children under the age of six with a \$500 kick-start to a Registered Education

Savings Plan (RESP), with no family contribution required. Despite the program being cancelled, there's still time to qualify for the 2015 ACES grant. If you currently have a child under the age of six, we encourage you to apply before the end of July.

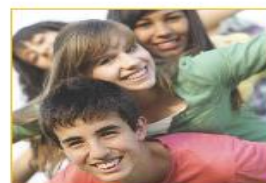
