Principal's Message

I recently had the pleasure of watching our drama students rehearse for their upcoming performance of *Seussical the Musical*. Audience members are in for a treat on January 25-28, 2016, at Festival Place, as this promises to be an amazing performance.

This holiday season, Lakeland Ridge will be holding a Winter Festival during the evening of December 16th, instead of a holiday concert. Due to the size of our gyms and fire code restrictions on seating, in past years we have had to hold a number of concerts over multiple evenings. This year, we are changing to a Winter Festival with activities for children and families throughout the school. Our spring concert will be held on Tuesday, April 26, 2016, in the Sherwood Park Alliance Church, located at the corner of Clover Bar Road and Wye Road. The church seats about 2200 people and has ample parking. More details to follow.

The month of November holds many exciting activities including our Remembrance Day ceremony on November 6th, at 10:30 in the Kona Gym. Seniors from Linking Generations will attend and will sit with their Linking Generations students during the assembly. My own 91-year-old father and WWII veteran will also be in attendance.

Fall break brings an opportunity for students to relax, unwind and enjoy a different routine. For those who are traveling or taking time off during fall break, enjoy this special time with your children.

National Bullying Awareness Week is Nov. 15-21. Students in grades 4-9 will participate in the interactive play *The Bully Project* by the Concrete Theatre. Focus groups with our junior high boys and girls will be conducted during health classes about our students' responses to last year's Tell Them From Me Survey. Of concern were the results of our junior high girls who were below our boys and Canadian Norms with respect to social-emotional outcomes. Tell Them From Me survey results indicated the following areas of concern: positive sense of belonging, valuing schooling outcomes, intellectual engagement, interest and motivation, positive teacher-student relations, positive learning climate, advocacy at school and expectations of success students. Counsellor's Corner

Experiencing stress is a natural part of life, even for children and teens, but too much stress can have a negative impact on our daily functioning, and can affect both our physical and emotional well-being. Stress impacts individuals differently. In other words, what is stressful to one person may not be as stressful to another.

Parents often can have a great impact on how their children manage stress:

- Be pro-active Talk about triggers for stress Look for patterns and identify situations that appear to cause stress for your child. Discuss when a stressful situation may be coming and make a plan to deal with it.
- Acknowledge feelings If something is making your child stressed, acknowledge feelings without judgement, even though it may be difficult to understand why something is causing stress.
- Identify what stress means for your child and remember that stress looks different for everyone. Discuss how to recognize stress. In other words, that may include helping your child identify what stress looks like, sounds like, and feels like.
- Be a role model Talk about and demonstrate your own stress reducing strategies. Using healthy stress relief strategies on a regular basis can help to reduce stress for everyone in the home.
- Explore stress management techniques Try a variety of strategies including using breathing techniques, being physical active, including healthy eating patterns, monitoring sleep, incorporating leisure activities, focusing on the positive, and sharing fun and laughter with friends and family.

EIPS Parent Survey

Student Transportation Launches the Versatrans My Stop App

Student Transportation's *Versatrans My Stop* app is now available for download. The *Versatrans My Stop* app offers a variety of features including bus location, estimated time of arrival, and the time your child scanned on and off the bus.

The *Versatrans My Stop* app is available on both <u>Google Play</u> and the <u>App Store</u>. Once downloaded to your smart phone, select "Elk Island Public Schools" from school district listing. Login using your username and password provided to you by Student Transportation at the beginning of the year - if you no longer have access to this information, contact Student Transportation.

The *Versatrans My Stop* app also offers a push-notification option when your child has scanned on or off the bus. To activate, simply go to "setup" to enable the feature. For more information, contact Student Transportation at 780-417-8151.

E-Waste Collection Challenge

November 30th to December 14th, Lakeland Ridge will be collecting electronic-waste at the side of the school near the dumpsters. Students and parents can bring in a variety of outdated or broken electronic devices including computer equipment, home-entertainment items, power tools, and small household appliances - basically anything the size of a microwave or smaller that can be plugged in or is battery-operated. Large appliances such as fridges, stoves, and dishwashers are excluded from the challenge. Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS), and Global Electric Electronic Processing (GEEP) have teamed up to launch the E-Waste Collection Challenge, collecting unused and unwanted electronics.

Throughout these two weeks, GEEP will gather all of the e-waste our school collects, document it, and weigh it. The school in Elk Island Public with the most e-waste - determined by dividing the total weight collected by the total number of students at each school - will win up to \$3,000. We encourage all of our families to participate - together we can make a difference!
