#### Principal's Message

This month we celebrate two very special events, both during the last week of April, our school's spring concert will be **Tuesday**, **April 26 at 6:30** at the Sherwood Park Alliance Church, corner of Clover Bar and Wye Roads and Lakeland Ridge School is honouring our volunteers at a special lunch on April 28. The theme of National Volunteer Week is "*Volunteers are the roots of strong communities*." According to a recent survey, more than 44% of Canadians volunteer. As our school prepares to recognize and thank our volunteers this month, we are humbled by the number of people who so generously volunteer to serve our school in many different ways.

The theme of National Volunteer Week caused me to reflect on the metaphor of a "tree" and the importance of "roots." A number of years ago, I had the opportunity to travel to South Africa where I learned about Acacia trees. These special trees have interconnected root systems so when animals like giraffe or elephants begin to overgraze on the leaves of a tree, that tree passes an "alarm signal" to its neighboring trees who begin producing a toxin in their leaves that make them taste bitter so the animal moves on. These trees are able to keep each other stronger by the very nature of their interconnectedness.

Just as a healthy root system is essential for trees to grow, flower and bear fruit, volunteers are also essential for our school to bloom. Thanks to our volunteers, our school continues to grow stronger each year. This year, our volunteers include busy parents who work with our school doing some of the many tasks that make classrooms such vital, interesting places to learn. Volunteers also sort and distribute hot lunch, coach teams, accompany field trips and so much more. Volunteering helps one find purpose in something greater than ourselves, our families, or our children while helping create a better school and enhancing opportunities for our students to learn and grow.

When I think of our school's volunteers, I am reminded of Mrs. Kellie Smith who continued to volunteer at the school this year while on medical leave as she battled cancer. While Mrs. Smith will leave a tremendous legacy at Lakeland Ridge, a tangible memory in honour of Mrs. Smith will be the construction of a Buddy Bench on the playground. Mrs. Smith's family asked that in lieu of flowers, memorial gifts be made to Lakeland School to construct a Buddy Bench. The premise is simple but effective. When a child is lonely, he or she child will sit on the beach, signaling others to invite them to play. I am very pleased to report that Lakeland Ridge has received enough money to begin construction on two benches. We believe Mrs. Smith would have loved this idea.

#### **Spring Concert**

The Lakeland Ridge School's Spring Concert will be held on Tuesday, April 26 at 6:30 pm at the Sherwood Park Alliance Church (Strathcona Christian Academy), located at the corners of Clover Bar Road & Wye Road. All Kindergarten to Grade 6 students and students in our Junior High band will be performing. The concert is FREE for parents and guests. Seating will be on a first come, first served basis with auditorium doors opening at 6:00 pm. Parents, grandparents and special guests are welcome.

We are asking students to arrive by 6:15 pm to meet their teachers at their designated drop off locations which the students will learn about during their field trip on April 26. The students are bussed to the church to practice stage entrances, exits, drop off and pick up location and to become familiar with the facility. Please send your child with a bag lunch that day and note that microwaves will not be available. Field trip forms for the concert practice on April 26 were sent home with students before Spring Break.

A map of designated drop off and pick up locations together with more details about the concert will be sent home with students closer to the concert date. As well, the concert will be recorded and the recording will be available for purchase. Further details will be provided in the information that will be sent home.

Junior high leadership students will be helping to direct parking. The overflow parking lot to the east of the church may be open, depending on weather conditions (wet weather closer to the concert date may make the overflow field too muddy to use). To help raise funds to offset costs of renting the church, bussing students to the church for practice, and costs for the Grade 9 Farewell, our Grade 9 Leadership class is raffling VIP Parking and/or VIP Front Row Seating for this concert. Winners will receive front row seats at the concert or parking spaces very close to the church. Raffle tickets are being sold in the school's office for \$2 per chance (for either parking or front row seating) until the morning of Monday, April 25. #### Parent Advisory Council (PAC) Update

The March meeting of Lakeland Ridge School Council was held on Wednesday, March 23, just prior to Spring Break. Unfortunately quorum was not reached and formal business was unable to be conducted. Those in attendance did take the opportunity to engage with Administration, our Trustee Representative and guests in attendance on a variety of different matters.

Unfortunately we must report on some extremely disappointing news as it pertains to temperature conditions in our portable classrooms. At our February meeting, School Council was delighted to learn that after many years of effort, decisions were made to ensure our portables would have air conditioning installed during this year's Spring Break. Our School Administration had determined this as a priority item and allocated school based funds to cover the capital costs. This along with the commitment we received last year from EIPS Administration to cover installation, operating and maintenance costs finally resolved this long-standing issue and need in our school.

Unfortunately at our March meeting, our Principal advised that the District not going to install air conditioning in all portables, but that it had intervened on this school based funding decision and exerted influence to cause our school Administration to revisit the decision to install air conditioning in all portables. School Council was advised that only one portable would be outfitted with air conditioning as a pilot, with installation timing not confirmed.

The rationale for this intervention and reversal of a past commitment on the part of EIPS Administration appears to be motivated not by what is in the best interests of providing an adequate learning environment for students and staff in Lakeland Ridge School, but rather a precedent that the District sees being established for all EIPS schools with portable classrooms. We empathize with others who may be facing a similar situation but cannot accept that intolerable conditions must continue in our classrooms because Administration will not make capital funding decisions for all schools, or honour the commitment previously made to Lakeland Ridge School students, staff and parents. Accordingly advocacy efforts will be resumed in efforts to get EIPS to honour their past commitments and address a situation in our portables that has existed for far too long already.

The next meeting will be on Monday, April 25 at 6:30 pm in the school library. As always, free childcare will be provided. We look forward to seeing you there.

If you would like to register your Kindergarten to Grade 12 child in Elk Island Public Schools at a school other than their designated school in the 2016-2017 school year, you must **apply to do so by April 14, 2016.** 

All interested families must fill out a Boundary Exemption Request Form and submit it directly to their requested school. The Boundary Exemption Request Form, along with additional information about the boundary exemption request process, can be found by visiting <a href="https://www.eips.ca/schools/boundaries/boundary-exemption-request-process">www.eips.ca/schools/boundaries/boundary-exemption-request-process</a>. Final decisions will be made by April 22, 2016.

Boundary Exemption Requests will not be accepted after the April 14 deadline.

NOTE: Students already accepted into their non-designated school do not need to reapply.


#### A Big *THANK YOU* To All Of Our Volunteers
