Principal's Message

I recently attended the Pride of Strathcona County Awards, recognizing outstanding contributions and achievements of county residents. Two Lakeland Ridge School parents received this honour, Michelle Lyster and Bridgett Hardy-Crytes. Michelle is the parent of a kindergarten student and an active member of our school's Parent Action Society. She was recognized as the president of the Sherwood Park Curling Club, whose League Executive received the Outstanding Group Award for their revitalization of the Glen Allan Curling Club, increasing membership and work to bring the 2016 Grand Slam of Curling's Champion Cup to Sherwood Park.

The top award at the Pride of Strathcona Awards Ceremony, the Mayor's Award, was presented to Bridgett Hardy-Crytes. Bridgett is the mother of a grade one Lakeland Ridge student. Mayor Roxanne Carr said of Bridgette, "We've all seen Bridgette out there somewhere as a piper, Safety Bear, or the Red Turkey during Read-in-Week where she visited 20 Strathcona County schools". As president of the RCMP Pipe Band, Bridgett has volunteered more than 300 hours this past year. What he said struck me, as it speaks to the richness of those who invest their time and talents in helping others and who share their abundant energies in service. Bridgette and Michelle are among those who volunteer so freely of their time and talents because they know what it means to live well, belong, serve and celebrate. We are proud of you!

Counsellor's Corner

An important part of having a successful day at school or work depends on healthy eating and making nutritious choices that fuel our minds and bodies. For children and adolescents, healthy eating is crucial to healthy growth and development. Students pay attention to what adults are eating so parents and teachers should be aware that they are modelling important choices. Mornings can be challenging in many households trying to get the family out the door with a healthy breakfast in their belly (or school bag) and a well-balanced lunch for later. Meal planning and mindful grocery shopping are crucial to having the right foods in the house.

Alberta Health Services has a wealth of information on their website with ideas and tips for healthy breakfasts, snacks, lunches, and dinners. As well, there is a 'Healthy Food Checker' which is a quick and easy tool that uses nutritional information to place food into one of the following categories: choose most often, choose sometimes, or choose least often. The 'Healthy Food Checker' is simple to use and these are categories that children and adolescents can understand and use to ensure a healthy choice of foods every day. Have your child use the "Healthy Food Checker' to input some of their favorite foods to see what category they fit into. It's also simple to use when grocery shopping to ensure you are making healthy choices of foods to put in the fridge and pantry.

Changes to Bylaws

At the May 30, 2016, Special Meeting, members voted to amend the bylaws. Some key changes were:

- Eliminating the requirement to serve on board for one year before serving as Chair. We did not want to have this key position vacant by limiting it to just a few people or if a previous board member was not willing or able to serve as Chair.
- Excluding <u>only</u> administration and teaching staff from being voting members and serving on the board (note: their exclusion is required by government regulation). *Currently*, <u>all</u> staff, including lunch supervisors, educational assistants, etc., cannot be members, many of whom have been excellent PAS supporters/volunteers but have had no say in how the Society operates. We rectified that.
- Moving elections from May to be held in conjunction with the AGM in October. Not only will this make the AGM more relevant and "attendance-worthy," it's human nature that people are more likely to step up and get involved at the beginning of "the season." This means the term of the current board of directors has been extended until the AGM in October 2017.

At the May 30 meeting, PAS provided funds for:

- Leader in Me annual licensing fee

Without the collective parent support of both time and money, we could not achieve our purpose: to contribute classroom and program resources that would otherwise not be available in order to improve and enrich the educational experience of our children.

Heat in the Portable Classrooms - What Can Parents Do?

It's no secret to any parent/guardian of current and past grade 3 & 4 students (and their teachers!) that the portable classrooms get extremely hot in the spring and fall. Temperatures are often 5-10 degrees higher inside the portables than outside, reaching 30C-35C on hot "summer" days. This creates a far from ideal teaching and learning environment. Lights are off, several fans are running, complaints of dehydration, lethargy, headaches and lack of focus abound. Sometimes classes are moved to the library, common area or outside to escape "the furnace." Most times, they just suffer through it. While portables are hot by nature (poor insulation and ventilation systems), the placement of the ones at LLR (direction, placed on the tarmac instead of grass) exacerbate the effect.

For the past couple years, LLR School Council has been advocating to Elk Island Public Schools for the installation of air conditioning units in the portables. EIPS's current stance is that IF parents pay for the units (\$35,000), the division will pay for the increased maintenance and utility costs. PAS does not have this amount of money in its coffers, and there is debate as to whether the Society should fund this type of expenditure even if it did have the money. We have explored the band-aid solution of purchasing portable a/c units for those classrooms; however EIPS's facilities department has declined their approval due to concerns over security, insufficient electrical capacity and the risk of triggering heating from the boilers.

This year, PAS will be getting a boost to its bottom line once it receives its proceeds from last January's casino. Alberta Gaming prohibits the use of casino funds for infrastructure expenses like a/c units however, we've been advised we can make an appeal based on the case of the significant impact a/c could make to the learning environment at the school. To that end, **PAS will be sending out a survey to gather parent, student and teacher feedback on their experiences with temperatures in the portable classrooms.** This feedback could also be useful when applying for other grants. NOTE: even if Alberta Gaming agrees to allow this type of expenditure, it does not mean that PAS would do so - that would still be up for a vote. The purpose of this exercise is to determine viable options.

On a positive note, the advocacy work by LLR School Council and Parent Action Society has resulted in getting this issue on the EIPS radar. The division is currently undergoing an assessment of portable conditions throughout the entire division to determine if and what action is required on this issue. We are pleased that EIPS is responding to our concerns and that there is a possibility that, where warranted, school communities throughout the division could benefit from our efforts. However, this process could take months or years to yield any results for Lakeland Ridge and we have no way of knowing if the end result will be a/c units for our portables. What we do know is that students and staff will continue to suffer from extreme heat and its impact on the quality of their education experience. This is why parent leadership will continue to advocate and explore solutions.

Fort McMurray Families

This spring, we have had 25 Fort McMurray students attending Lakeland Ridge School, displaced from their homes and community due to the wild fire that continues to burn. I must say that I have been so proud of our students, families and staff as they have embraced the opportunity to welcome



new students and their families to our school. Parents provided school supplies, donated diapers, toiletries and took them to the relief centres, provided cash that was donated to the Red Cross for relief efforts and provided fun and entertainment at a luncheon we held during our Professional Development day on April 13 for families and students from Fort McMurray in our school. The picture below is of a dance team (two members are current Lakeland Ridge students). These beautiful young women attended the luncheon, providing goodie bags to the students who were there and applied glitter tattoos to those interested. It is in the small acts of kindness that we are reminded of the human connection between us all.

We know our Fort McMurray families will continue to struggle as they have the opportunity to visit their homes or what is left of them in the next few weeks as the province provides restricted access

to assess the damage. Our thoughts and prayers continue to be with you as you face the challenges to come.

Excellence in Teaching Semi-Finalist

We were recently informed that Bonnie Edgecombe has been selected as a semi-finalist for Excellence in Teaching, following a rigorous selection process. Award recipients are honoured at a reception, dinner and awards presentation in June. We wish Mrs. Edgecombe continued success in this selection process.

Enrollment and Budget Update

Currently, we are projecting 731 students for the school year 2016-17. This year's September 30 count was 737. 731 is only a projection, as we know families will move into and out of our school boundary over the summer. Currently we project 65 students in kindergarten, 63 students in grade one, 59 students in grade two, 79 students in grade three, 85 students in grade four, 75 students in grade five, 78 students in grade 6, 70 students in grade seven, 85 students in grade eight, and 72 students in grade nine.

Enrollments help determine our school's budget allocation and since our budget was just submitted in May, parents might like to know that Lakeland Ridge School received almost 4.5 million dollars for the upcoming school year. These funds support 35.4 teachers, counsellors and administrators making up 82% of our budget and 13 support staff including office, library and educational assistants making up 14% of our budget. That leaves 4% of our budget to cover anticipated expenditures for text books, library subscriptions, photocopying, supplies and materials, physical education equipment, art supplies, equipment, furniture, computers, and amortization of capital expenditures such as our school's bus, video surveillance system, storage shed, etc.

Things can and probably will change over the summer as students move in or out but at this point in time, this is our school's enrollment and budget snapshot.

New Report Cards for Lakeland Ridge School's Elementary Students in 2016-2017

Lakeland Ridge is pleased to announce implementation of the Elk Island Public Schools' (EIPS) new elementary report cards for the 2016-2017 school year. Developed by EIPS and piloted by eleven elementary schools this year, the report cards are designed to enhance communication about student progress in grades 1 to 6.

In 2014, EIPS established a Communicating Student Learning committee, made up of parents, teachers, administrators, trustees, and central office staff. Using feedback from close to 1,000 parents and 400 principals and teachers, the committee has developed an innovative reporting system focused on student achievement in academic outcomes and learner attributes.

Teachers will continue to assess all areas of the current programs of studies. However, student learning will be reported using a five-point numeric scoring scale. Teachers will communicate student achievement in clear, parent-friendly language for each subject providing personalized information about each student in relation to learner attributes, areas of strength, areas for growth, and next steps. The current Excellent, Proficient, Acceptable, Limited (EPAL) scale will no longer be used.
